# Worth the weight

remember when 36-24-36 was considered the perfect figure for a woman. My sister Nita had such a shape, and at 5 feet 4 inches tall she would have been a size 10-12, which was considered "just right".

Twiggy came along in 1968 and all that changed. Girls wanted to be stick thin and flat chested; the flatter they were, the better they looked in the clothes. Sadly, all that led to eating disorders – not that I recall any of my friends suffering from such a condition. Perhaps they were different times.

Dr Cecilia Bergh from Sweden's Karolinska Institute, the largest in Europe, is in Melbourne for the 3th anniversary of the Mandometer clinics.

"I remember it exactly," Dr Bergh says. "It was October 27, 1993. A colleague in the Karolinska emergency department rang and asked if I could help with a patient who was suffering from a very serious eating disorder. She weighed 27 kilograms. I worked with the patient for nine months and she was our first success. Today she is a judge and lawyer."

From that chance encounter has come a program, Mandometer, which has saved lives. To date they have treated 140 patients in Stockholm.

The Brighton Mandometer Clinic opened in March this year, and the success rate for patients has prompted the clinic's Swedish founders to choose Melbourne from their clinics worldwide as the place to expand.

The Mandometer program teaches patients how to eat normally. It is different from other treatments, as it dispels the popular theory that correlates eating disorders with mental illness. Instead, Mandometer treats the disordered eating as the cause of the illness.

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
One in every 100 adolescent girls in Australia will develop anorexia nervosa, while two in every 100 will develop bulimia.


